

History & Overview

Georgetown, Texas was established in 1848 and has several homes listed on the National Register of Historic Districts. The city was named after George Washington Glasscock, who donated the land for a county seat. The initial growth for the city began when Southwestern University was established in 1873 followed by the addition of a railroad in 1878. Since that time, Georgetown, Texas has been named the "Fastest Growing City in the U.S." Located in Williamson County about 30 miles north of downtown Austin, Georgetown features beautiful examples of Victorian architecture and is surrounded by amazing natural attractions.



Education

Georgetown ISD serves Williamson County students from pre-kindergarten to 12th grade. Private school alternatives are available as well. Southwestern University, Austin Community College Round Rock Campus, Texas State University's Round Rock Campus and Texas State Technical College are some of the higher education choices.



Major Business Industries

The city of Georgetown is home to a diverse group of employers. The main industries include manufacturing, construction, healthcare, professional services, retail and trade and transportation. Southwestern University, St. David's Georgetown Hospital, Texas Corporation and GAF Energy.
